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A Message from Our CEO

This year marks our third year officially as The Magic Coat Foundation. Our services and resources continue to evolve to meet evergrowing demand. I would like to draw your attention to this quote below.

"It is not what you do for your children but what you have taught them to do for themselves that will make them successful human beings." — Ann Landers

There is currently discussion in the community to change our school curriculum to include a "behaviour curriculum", which will teach children how to act and behave appropriately in the classroom.

This may seem absurd to many people, but children need to be explicitly taught certain behaviours. While this used to be taught by parents in the home, parents are now taking less and less responsibility for teaching their children, so the responsibility is falling on schools and teachers.

What is important to understand is that no behaviour curriculum is ever going to work unless children are taught how to have social/emotional skills, which include how to manage big feelings. This is why The Magic Coat program is so important.

All human behaviour is directly correlated to the thoughts and feelings that people have.

Event > Thought > Feeling > Behaviour

Children need to be taught that while they cannot always control the things that happen to them (the event), they do have the power to change their thought, which will change their feeling and ultimately their behaviour.

The Magic Coat program teaches children how to change their thoughts through our various workshops and resources.

For teachers, parents, doctors, nurses and anyone working with children, we provide a common language and a tool kit, to help them understand that a child's behaviour is caused by an event or trauma that requires help and understanding.

"Nine times out of ten, the story behind the misbehaviour won't make you angry: it will break your heart." – Annette Breux

It is for this reason the Foundation has continued to grow its collaboration with other organisations that are helping families and children.

This year we completed an adaptation of The Magic Coat storybook for both Breast Cancer Care WA and Sorrento Surf Life Saving Club and trained staff and volunteers of both organisations in how to use The Magic Coat program. We are also continually learning ourselves. It is through listening and observing that we can create resources specific to our clients' needs.

A research study with The University of Western and Australia and Curtin University was also completed this year. The results of this study are included in a report by Dr David Preece in this document. Not only does this research show us that we are on the right track in supporting children's mental health and wellbeing; it has also helped to identify areas where we can do better.

I have always said that a good program doesn't hand a completed resource over and walk away. A good program will continue to develop and test its resources and continually find ways to do better and get better outcomes.

The Magic Coat Foundation doesn't go a day without reviewing its different resources and creating new ones.

2023 saw us step up to support another international cause, as we did for the children of Ukraine. When we heard about the war in the Middle East and saw all the innocent children displaced, losing homes and family, we could not stand by and do nothing. I wrote a specially adapted version of The Magic Coat for the children of the Middle East. I'd like to thank Egg Design Group for donating their time to bring this new edition of The Magic Coat book to life.

The Foundation has made this freely available on the website in English, Arabic and Hebrew in the hope that we can help as many children caught up in this awful war as possible.

Back home in Perth, we were able to install some amazing visual resources into both Ronald McDonald House and Perth Children's Hospital, including an interactive education wall and positive affirmations, to keep the kids positive and smiling. Images of these are available in this report. Look out for them if you visit either of these places.

Of course, none of our projects would be possible without our fundraising efforts. Both our Golf Day and our Annual Fundraising Ball were a great success. We are so grateful for all those who attended and dug deep to help us reach our goal. Thanks to our sponsors, attendees and volunteers we raised \$150K at our ball. This is the largest amount raised to date.

A big shout out and thank you to Nicky Bailey for all her hard work and efforts in making sure Magic Coat events were a success once again. Nicky and her team at Egg Design also donated a huge amount of time during the year to ensure that all our visual resources were created to perfection, as they have done for several years now.

To provide essential support to children and families, equipping them with the necessary tools to navigate their emotional wellbeing with strength and resilience. Together, we strive to create a brighter future for our young ones by nurturing their inner strength and promoting a culture of care and empathy.

Our Impact

Magic Coat has impacted thousands of people over the last few years. The resources we provide give everyone a common language and tool to effectively communicate with any child in their life about mental health, whether they be a parent, carer, teacher, medical specialist or otherwise.

Our Values



About The Magic Coat

The Magic Coat is a preventative mental health program for children aged 4-11 years. The Magic Coat has been developed to help create calm, confident and caring kids who know how to problem solve, feel safe and manage their emotions appropriately so that they have good mental health and wellbeing.

The Magic Coat is an analogy of an imaginary coat that children must put on every day. Within the coat are a series of pockets, each containing a different character that represents a different skill or strategy that children can use to face difficult situations in their life.

The Magic Coat has been developed into a series of workshops for children addressing issues such as managing worry and anxiety, managing friendships and bullying and managing anger.

In addition, the program offers workshops for parents that focus on setting boundaries, making connections and disciplining with love. The focus of these workshops is to teach parents how they can use The Magic Coat to best support their children's mental health and wellbeing.

The Magic Coat also offers professional development training for teachers and other professionals working with children. The professional development training accredits professionals to use The Magic Coat program in their work with children both one-on-one and in small group settings.

At the core of The Magic Coat initiative is Di Wilcox, a former schoolteacher and mother of two, driven by a commitment to children's wellbeing. With a background in Women and Children's Studies and Education, Di's journey began when she noticed students struggling to focus due to life worries.

Drawing from Positive Psychology and Cognitive Behaviour Therapy, Di crafted lessons that evolved into The Magic Coat program. Its success garnered interest from other educators and schools, growing into a comprehensive initiative making a positive impact in Australia and beyond.



MAD established in 2006 to raise funds for individuals falling through the cracks in community support.



Major support from Broome International Airport Pty Ltd covering CEO wages and providing pro bono financial and admin support.



Supported diverse projects for community, including housing and aiding underprivileged teenagers in sports.



Focus shifted toward mental health, particularly children's. Decision made to integrate The Magic Coat program into MAD.



Rebranded as The Magic Coat Foundation (MCF) to emphasise the new focus on children's mental health.



Aim to introduce The Magic Coat program in the wider community. Seek additional funding to broaden program delivery and reach.



Continue successful fundraising events and explore additional sponsorships and government funding to support expansion.

About The Foundation

The Magic Coat Foundation is a not-forprofit organisation, focused on providing mental health programs to Western Australian children. The Magic Coat Foundation implements this through a number of different projects with a strong focus on the wellbeing of young children and the care they receive from adults in their lives.

Make A Difference WA Foundation (MAD) was established in 2006 by a group of Western Australian business people who wanted to raise funds to help individuals in the community.

In recent years MAD shifted its focus to children's mental health through a partnership with The Magic Coat for Kids. This prompted the decision to integrate The Magic Coat program into MAD, leading to the rebranding as The Magic Coat Foundation (MCF) in 2021.

The Foundation aims to secure additional funding for expanding program delivery and reach in the wider community, emphasising a positive impact on the future generation.

Programs and Projects

School Programs

The Magic Coat team conducts workshops in Western Australian schools for primary-aged children, addressing mental health topics like managing friendships, bullying, worry, anxiety, anger, transitioning to high school, positive body image, and self-esteem for older groups.

Schools with Index of Community Socio-Educational Advantage (ICSEA) scores of 950+ are requested to fund workshops, enabling the Foundation to support schools with scores below 950. ICSEA scores range from 500 (extreme disadvantage) to 1300 (extreme advantage).

Parenting Program

To ensure that children are receiving the best support for their mental health and wellbeing, it is important that parents also have the skills to help support their children at home. To achieve this, the Foundation provides parenting workshops to vulnerable families in the community.

Specifically, the Foundation provides parenting workshops to the women in Bandyup and Boronia prisons, as well as women in refuges. We teach mothers how to use The Magic Coat as a common language to best support their children's mental health. We also provide resources to help support their child's mental health at home.



School Breakfasts

The Magic Coat Foundation provide a small number of low-socioeconomic schools with a holistic breakfast program.

The breakfast program relies on parent volunteers to run the day-to-day operation of the project whilst the Foundation financially supports the provision of meals. In 2022, the Foundation provided 16,000 meals to over 400 students across Western Australia.



Magic Coat Allstars

For children facing terminal illness, severe trauma, poverty, or extreme disadvantage, The Magic Coat Foundation introduced the 'Magic Coat All Stars Program.'

Nominated by the community, a select group of children enjoy memorable experiences, organised by dedicated volunteers Adelene Aveling and Kendall De Sousa. These experiences range from corporate suite sporting events, meetings with favorite celebrities, and five-star restaurant dinners to backstage encounters at theater shows.



The Treasure Box

The Treasure Box series features Di Wilcox interviewing children about their use of The Magic Coat in their lives, often focusing on those facing challenges.

Di also records Magic Coat lessons with children to help teachers integrate its strategies into their classrooms. Feedback indicates the Treasure Box is a simple, visual and effective tool for sharing Magic Coat usage. These videos are shared on The Magic Coat YouTube channel.





The Pocket

In 2021, thanks to the generosity of the JJ Leach Group, The Magic Coat Foundation received a donated space in Claremont that was named 'The Pocket'. Through collaboration with the JJ Leach Group, local businesses and individuals, The Pocket transformed into a serene, engaging environment for young children to visit.

The Foundation hosts regular community workshops for parents and children, and provides one-on-one coaching for children aged 5-11 at The Pocket.



The Foundation's Place in WA Schools

The Magic Coat Foundation is well placed in Western Australian schools as we strive to provide schools with the most holistic approach to supporting their student's mental health and wellbeing.

To do this, the Foundation offers The Magic Coat Curriculum which has been written to meet the objectives of the Western Australian Schools Curriculum and Standards Authority (SCASA) for Pre-Primary to Year 6 students. Specifically, the program meets the minimum standard requirements as outlined by the Health and Physical Education Syllabus.

In addition to this, The Magic Coat Foundation recognises the crucial role that both parents and teachers play in a child's development.

It is for this reason that the Foundation also provides education and resources to both parents and teachers to assist them to best support their child's/student's mental health.

The Foundation ensures that the education and support being offered to parents and teachers aligns with the schools' values and goals and thus will adapt The Magic Coat program and resources to meet these needs.

The Magic Coat Foundation will continue to evolve alongside schools to ensure that schools continue to utilise the tools and strategies taught in The Magic Coat to help support students' wellbeing.





The Foundation's Place in WA's Mental Health Crisis

Mental health problems in childhood can have a substantial impact on wellbeing. In addition, there is strong evidence that mental disorders in childhood and adolescence predict mental illness in adulthood.

41% of children reported that the pandemic had a negative impact on their wellbeing and at the time of the survey in early 2022, around one in five children reported that they were feeling more down, scared or worried than they used to.

The Magic Coat Foundation offers an essential service that is not replicated in any other West Australian charity. The Foundation provides an early intervention program that targets a child's mental health prior to them developing a mental health issue.

The program teaches children the necessary skills they need to help manage their emotions, be resilient and overcome problems, all of which are necessary to prevent mental illness.

Furthermore, The Magic Coat Foundation ensures that these resources are affordable and easily accessible for all Western Australian families.

In order to overcome WA's mental health crisis, we need to provide solutions for families that help them to seek the support they need before their children reach a crisis point.

The Foundation's Place

in Hospitals

The Magic Coat Foundation recently collaborated with Perth Children's Hospital for a research project, which aims to bring positivity and joy to the hospital environment.

Wall decals transformed sterile spaces, creating a vibrant atmosphere of hope by reinforcing The Magic Coat strategies.


Special hospital packs, filled with Magic Coat goodies, were curated for the courageous children in the ward.

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Our Impact at Ronald McDonald House Charities WA

How We Support

Breast Cancer Care WA

The Magic Coat Foundation heard that many of the children whose parents were suffering breast cancer received very little support for their mental health. Di Wilcox reached out to Breast Cancer Care WA and they were thrilled when the Foundation offered three free Magic Coat sessions for children referred to the Foundation by their team.

We have also released an adaptation of The Magic Coat book for children whose parents are going through breast cancer. These Magic Coat editions will be given freely to those children.

So far, we have already donated 500 books to Breast Cancer Care WA, and we plan to donate many more.

Additionally, we are actively seeking new ways to provide resources that will make a meaningful difference to children whose parents are battling breast cancer.


